

Summer Greetings from the Headteacher

I am delighted to share our summer news as we reach the end of term and look forward to the holidays and a well-earned break. Our students and staff certainly deserve one as you will see with all the activities they have been involved in recently, not to mention the enrichment opportunities happening this week. I must say it has been a full and proper academic year with (possibly!) even more trips and visits than ever before. So put the kettle on and peruse what has been going on at The Burgate.

Our students have engaged with many opportunities beyond their lessons, demonstrating Burgate values such as enthusiasm, ambition and creativity. Trips abroad have featured strongly this academic year and it comes as little surprise that studying a language as an option choice is now very popular. The Creative Arts and sporting successes also feature heavily, as is our tradition. We have had other notable successes to read about such as reaching the National Final of the First Lego League Competition in April and winning the Debating Matters competition at The House of Lords in March. And today, three handmade bird boxes landed on my desk courtesy of Business Studies students (and future entrepreneurs!) who were involved in the 'Tenner Challenge'.

Our Year 11 and Year 13 students worked hard to ensure they were entirely focussed and 'exam ready' for their finals; we have every hope for great their results when we welcome them back during the summer holidays. I would like to thank every member of staff from the teachers in the classroom, to the learning support assistants, the catering team, the admin team and the caretaking staff for supporting our students, making school a happy and safe environment, and always striving to go above and beyond.

We have had a busy time working to achieve additional resources for the school and I am delighted to announce that the school has been successful in its bid for a new site-wide fire safety system and electrical works. This will include installation of a new fire alarm system, detection and emergency lighting to meet L2 compliance, alongside a full electrical and IT rewire to avoid further power failures and possible school closure. The total project cost is £2,244,244 funded by the Department for Education's Condition Improvement Fund, with a school contribution of £20,000. The project will commence mid-way through the Autumn Term, taking approximately 14 months to complete, intending to achieve much improved teaching facilities and classroom environments, but with minimal disruption to learning.

Further solar panels are currently being installed on the roof of the sixth form (Sarum Building) adding to our existing solar array in our quest to become a carbon neutral school before the end of the decade.

Additionally, the Main School girls' and boys' toilets will be totally modernised, giving complete individual privacy, whilst making the toilet area more open plan and robust enough to meet the rigours of the high volume of usage. Students have been consulted about the proposed plans, which have met with broad approval. Work begins immediately at the end of term.

I would like to thank all those parents that took to time to respond to the parent survey. This, along with the student survey, gives us an invaluable perspective as we seek to improve our school in line with your expectations. Thank you also for sharing your experiences and feedback with us. It is always a real pleasure to read about individual successes both at school and in the wider community.

In September, there will be new approaches for our student recognition system and the way we report on student progress which will be outlined in more detail in the Autumn Newsletter at the start of the new term.

I am extremely proud of all our students and staff who continue to develop their confidence to navigate our everchanging world. Team Burgate has united in values of kindness, inclusivity and ambition. Throughout this year, we have inspired curiosity and enthusiastically embraced many exciting opportunities as you will see in the following pages.

Hopefully good weather will continue long into the summer holidays, and you will enjoy much deserved time with your families and friends. We look forward to welcoming our new Year 7 and Year 12 on Monday 4 September and the rest of the school on Tuesday 5 September.

Message from the Chair of Trustees

It's the end of another busy school year and the dawn of summer holidays, with the promise of the chance to unwind before the new challenges ahead. For those of you who have been going through the stress of exams, I am sure the summer can't come soon enough and the Trustees hope that you achieve the results that you need to be successful.

I started my first term as Chair of the Trustees in December 2020 and therefore still find it a novelty to be writing about a school year which hasn't had to refer to disruption caused by the pandemic. But although the threat of lockdowns now seems a strange memory, as Trustees we are faced with the task of ensuring the school reacts appropriately to the unprecedented period we've lived through. The Board has had several sessions where the Leadership team have explained the different ways they see the impact of the pandemic on the students - for example, different ability levels caused by disruption to learning in primary schools, increased absenteeism, and even differences in the engagement of parents. Although these present new challenges, the leadership team and the school staff have continued to work hard with the aim of ensuring that all the students at the Burgate are able to enjoy their learning and feel valued for who they are, which remains our vision of success. As part of this, the Trustees were pleased to adopt the school leadership's new Improvement Plan, a document which sets the strategy behind the teaching and learning that goes on at the school. Although early in its three-year approach, we are already seeing exciting developments in areas such as metacognition and curriculum - and if you want to know more about those topics, please get in touch.

I know that many of you will have felt the disruption caused by strike days. Again, the Trustee board has kept an eye on the Leadership team's management of this impact and have been impressed by how the school has resisted the option to close its doors and strive to keep students in an educational setting where possible, and as a result the Burgate has lost far fewer teaching days than many comparable schools. As Trustees we also have a responsibility to our staff (striking or otherwise) and know that the decisions they have faced will not have been easy. Hopefully you will agree with me that the school took the best possible line, of putting student welfare first while also meeting the legal duty of not undermining strike action.

The Trustee Board has also been busy considering how best the Burgate Academy Trust should be structured, and whether we should seek to form a Multi-Academy Trust with other, like-minded schools in the region. As at the time of writing no plans to form a MAT exist, but the Board does see the value in exploring this idea further, for the benefits it can bring to our students and staff. If there is more news on this, we will of course let you know. The Board has also seen some significant changes, as we completed a necessary legality to separate the Board into Trustees and Members. Whilst the Trustees have the responsibility of ensuring that the Leadership of the school make sensible decisions, the Members make sure that the Trustees are doing our role well.

Separating Members from Trustees has not been easy, and no one will see any difference in the way the school operates day-to-day - but it means we now operate under best practice, and that the governance of the school is stronger than it ever has been. I'd like to thank our new clerk, Linda Williamson, and the Head Teacher's secretary, Sarah Hewitt, for their considerable efforts to make this happen, and our new Members for volunteering their time for the good of the school. While writing, I'd also like to welcome the Trustees who have joined the Board this year - Mr John Whitmell, our two new parent-elected Trustees, Mrs Alice Richardson and Dr Robert Milsted, and most recently Mr Nigel Himmel and Dr Helena McVeigh.

Leaving us is Matt Hughes and Ian Newman, and I would like to thank them both for their time as Trustees. In particular, Ian has been involved with the school for a generation, stretching back to when he was head boy, and I was pleased to be part of a small gathering who celebrated Ian's time by presenting him with 'the key to the Burgate' as a lifelong friend to the school. Thank you Ian, for all you have done, and to my fellow Trustees, past and present. You can read more about the Trustees and Members on the school website.

One thing you have have noticed is the building work outside the school. After considerable disruption the approach to the school is now looking much better, with improved bus parking, no need for students to cross the busy main road, and new planting along the new fence which should improve the natural setting the school enjoys. We are also excited by news that the school is getting a new all-weather pitch installed to replace the old hockey surface, and we'd like to thank the school leadership for their hard work in making this happen, as well as funding from the Football Foundation and New Forest District Council. The school has also been successful in receiving national funding for the installation of new fire alarm system, detection and emergency lighting, alongside a full electrical rewire, and is looking to renew the old toilet blocks over the summer - both essential works to ensure the comfort, safety and security of everyone at the Burgate.




















Year 8 students created a collaborative installation that illuminates our connection to the living earth and to evoke a wider appreciation for the planet's biodiversity.

Our sixth form artists recently visited Bournemouth AUB where they were all inspired by the incredible creative work on display.




